Pursuant to DepEd Order No. 40, s. 2012, otherwise known as the "Child Protection Policy," which mandates all public and private elementary and secondary schools to establish a Child Protection Committee (CPC)¹, this Office, through the Bureau of Learner Support Services – Learner Rights and Protection Division (BLSS-LRPD), issued DepEd Memorandum No. DM-OUOPS-2025-11-02415² directing school heads to accomplish the CPC Functionality Assessment Tool with the participation of at least three (3) to four (4) committee members.

The assessment aims to evaluate the functionality and effectiveness of school-based CPCs in promoting and safeguarding learners' rights and protection. Specifically, it seeks to determine the extent to which CPCs are able to carry out their mandated roles and responsibilities, identify areas of improvement, and provide evidence-based inputs for strengthening child protection policies, programs, interventions, and capacity-building initiatives.

The CPC Functionality Assessment Tool, originally developed by the Social Watch Philippines (SWP) in partnership with DepEd, has been enhanced to strengthen the assessment of school-based CPCs and ensure alignment with current child protection policies, standards, and implementation requirements of the Department. The tool evaluates key areas of CPC operations, including organization and coordination, policy implementation, capacity-building and resource mobilization, referral and monitoring mechanisms, and learner protection services.

However, results generated by schools that used the earlier version for the previous and/or current school year shall remain valid. Schools may use the enhanced tool for assessing the functionality and performance of their school's CPC in the next school year.

To further ensure the accuracy, objectivity, and reliability of the assessment results, the enhanced CPC Functionality Assessment Tool includes Means of Verification (MOVs) for each indicator. These MOVs provide a comprehensive, evidence-based framework for assessing CPC performance, validating reported accomplishments, monitoring compliance with learner rights and protection standards, identifying implementation gaps, and informing the provision of appropriate technical assistance, policy enhancements, and program improvement initiatives.

In view of the foregoing, all concerned personnel, particularly members of the Child Protection Committee, are enjoined to actively participate in completing the assessment tool and in preparing and submitting the required MOVs to ensure the timely and accurate submission of assessment results.

RATING AND INTERPRETATION OF LEVEL OF FUNCTIONALITY

The overall score shall determine the level of functionality.

Level of Functionality	Definition
Level 1	<i>Not in Place or Absent</i> If total number of yes responses for the sub-indicators is from 0.00-0.99 . This indicate that the school's CPC is not yet in place or is not being implemented nor has it been reorganized to operationalize its functions.
Level 2	<i>Planning Stage</i> If the total number of yes responses for the sub-indicators is from 1.00-1.99 . This indicates the school's CPC is still in the planning stage or drawing plans to establish or reorganize the committee.
Level 3	<i>In Early Stages of Development</i> If the total number of yes responses for the sub-indicators is from 2.00-2.99 . This indicates the school's CPC is in the early stages of development, the CPC may have a written orientation material/guidebook for CPC members.
Level 4	<i>Partially Functional</i> If the total number of yes responses for the sub-indicators is from 3.00-3.99 . This indicates the school's CPC is partially functional, the CPC may have been established or reorganized, have operationalized some of its functions.
Level 5	<i>Fully Functional</i> If the total number of yes responses for the sub-indicators is from 4.00-5.00 . This indicates the school's CPC is fully functional, and the CPC has been established and operationalized, with clear plans for the strengthening of the child protection system in school.
